This has been another busy year for our council due to the many activities we are involved in. We are certainly living the motto Aliant Pioneer Volunteers People Helping People.

This year we were involved in over 40 different activities. many that have a lot of impact in our community such as the Hug a Bears, the Life Line Monitoring, the Computer for Schools, Operation Christmas Child. Christmas Boxes for the needy, Christmas Daddies, and Je M'aime Books

Annual Backpacks for Kids Program



- * The following is an excerpt from Robyn Tingley, Vice President, Communications and Public Affairs at Aliant, from an address made to senior Executives about the impact of Aliant Pioneers in Atlantic Canada:

On Sunday, May 6 thousands of walkers from 10 communities across Atlantic Canada raised \$200,000 for Kids Help Phone in the Aliant Walk for Kids Help Phone.

Kids Help Phone is Canada's only toll-free, 24-hour, bilingual and anonymous phone and web counselling, referral and information service for children and youth. Every day, professional counsellors provide immediate, caring support to young people in urban and rural communities across the country.

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Project Makes Leap From Hug-a-Bears to Breast Cancer Pillows

New Brunswick Chapter 51 of the Aliant Pioneer Volunteers, Moncton Council, recently launched a project at the Dr. Georges L-Dumont Regional Hospital (GLDRH) to make Breast Cancer pillows.

By placing the heart shaped pillows under the arm, it will help to ease the discomfort of patients who have had breast surgery. The pillows will be made through the Aliant Pioneer's existing Hug-A-Bear program.

Nurses at the hospital are very excited about the program. Currently there is nothing specifically used to provide comfort the new pillows will provide.

Statistics suggest there are approximately 500 new diagnosis of Breast Cancer each year in New Brunswick with the majority of patients being treated at hospitals in Moncton, Fredericton and Saint John. Chapter 51, Aliant Pioneer Volunteers, will be spreading the Breast Cancer

pillows program to hospitals throughout the province.

The Aliant Pioneer Volunteers of Newfoundland and Labrador Chapter 105 have been active for several years making Breast Cancer pillows for use throughout the Province.

With both New Brunswick Chapter 51 and Nova Scotia/ PEI Chapter 49 recently introducing the program, the "pillows of comfort" will be provided throughout the Atlantic Provinces by the Aliant Pioneer Volunteers"


Monthly Potluck for October becomes birthday celebration
