2007 President's Report

During the past year members of the Fort Pepperrell Life Members Club along with their partners and friends of pioneering have been involved in a variety of projects. Their commitment to improving the quality of life in our community, as well as the desire to participate in fellowship activity is clearly demonstrated in this report. The following are the highlights for this period.

PROJECTS

Computers for Schools: 1100 hours was spent picking up from donors and delivering approximately 1200 computers to schools from St. John's to Gander.

Max Simms Camp: 9 volunteers spent one week in June completing general

Maintenance work at the camp in Bishop's Falls. 1080 hours were volunteered.

TCH Cleanup: During June 43 people contributed 294 hours picking up 160 bags of garbage over 9 kilometers of the Trans Canada Highway. A social was held at bldg. 107 after the cleanup.

Heart Pillows: During the year 42 volunteers worked 459 hours making heart pillows which are donated to the Health Science Centre each month.

Crafts for Charities: Each week a team of 10-12 people meet for two mornings to make hand-crafted goods for the Cancer Clinic, Janeway Hospital, Senior's Homes, and Inner-City Schools. Items produced include woolen mittens, bibs, lap rugs, ball bags, breast cancer pillows, hug- a-bears and finger puppets. Over 2000 hours were accumulated completing those projects.

Community Partnership: Throughout the year a number of pioneers assisted other groups in the community in their fund raising events. These groups included: Festival

500, PGI Literacy, Aliant Walk for Kids, Bliss Murphy Center, Garden of Hope, Juvenile Diabetes, The Janeway Tele-thon, and The Janeway Radio-thon. Those projects accounted for over 1200 volunteer hours. **Regatta Day parking:** 38 volunteers contributed 156 hours and made this a very successful and profitable event.

I like Me: A number of Life Member Pioneers visited 23 schools on the Avalon Peninsula where they distributed 1096 books and read to the children. 335 volunteer hours were accumulated.

Pioneer National Convention: During June 6 Life Members prepared and served a surf and turf for this event.

Glenbrook Lodge: In June eight members went to the Glenbrook Lodge Senior's Home and completed a general clean up of the grounds around the facility.

Woodworkers Wednesday Luncheon: This is an ongoing event each week from Sept. to June, and is attended by 14 to 17 pioneers. All members take a turn at cooking, and \$5.00 is collected from each person which goes toward funding BBQ'S to which all members and partners are invited and buying small tools for the shop.

Volunteer Appreciation: A wine and cheese reception was held during volunteer week on April 15/07 to recognize the efforts of pioneers, partners and friends who gave so generously of their time. A number of national awards were presented to the club and also to various members for their outstanding contribution to pioneering.

New Years Eve: A dinner and dance is held for all pioneers and partners each year.

Pot Luck Dinner: usually two a year. One held on Paddy's Day, and one in the fall.

Valentines Dinner, Christmas and New year's Parties. We always get a good response to all events.

Dart League: 24 pioneers and partners play each Tuesday night from Oct. to June.

Other Activity

Woodworking Shop: Open 5 days a week. Some of the projects completed: 2 hope chests, 1 Kitchen Island, 1 butlers table, 15 memory boxes, 2 single and 5 double Adirondack lawn chairs.

Building Renovations: Improvements to make the building more comfortable were completed.

CPR Course: During June 13 members and partners participated in a CPR refresher course given by the Red Cross

Autism Society: Members constructed a greenhouse for this organization. The materials were paid for by Chapter 105 Fog Devils Golf: Members assisted this group in raising funds for "Real Time Cancer"
