Annual Backpacks for Kids Program

August 7th was the official launch of the Backpack for Kids program.

Backpack champions in the 3 Moncton locations were Michele Mouland (Mapleton Road and overall Lead), Rachel Leblanc (Alma) and Sandra King (Edinburgh Drive).



Michele got the campaign off to a great start with a great deal on supplies from Staples at Trinity Drive. Todd Tait (son of lifetime member "Baldy" Tait) is the Store Manager. For the low cost of \$26.00 we were able to fill a single backpack.

On Backpacks Adoption Day (August 7th) each of the Backpack Champions set up a Backpack adoption area at their location during the lunch break.

On Sunday, August 9th a group of 18 volunteers got together on Mapleton to package up the items for the backpacks. Within an hour they had filled 78 backpacks, packaged up supplies for 20 to ship to Edinburgh Drive and stored everything neat and tidy in Al Pendergast's office. (Photo on right, Al Pendergast)

On Mapleton there was a challenge between the Consumer Contact Centre teams

to adopt backpacks. One team had a Chili sale to raise funds, another advertise at a local campground. Donations were received from employees, Pioneers life members and outside sources. Foresters donated to the program and helped at the Mapleton packing event.

On Edinburgh Drive there were 3 fundraising events besides the regular donations. One week they held a BBQ at noon on Thursday and a 50/50 draw on Friday. Second week they held a Wednesday Bake Sale.



A significant donation was given to the Edinburgh Drive Office by the Hillside Baptist Church's Vacation Bible School group. Tanya MacLeod, (pictured below) Aliant employee and member of Hillside Baptist used one week of her vacation to run the Vacation Bible School. Each year, Hillside's Vacation Bible School chooses a missions project to support as part of their program. This year Hillside decided to choose a project that was community based and something the children could relate to. The money was raised through donations from families who had children participating in the program. A challenge was given to the children for every \$100 they raised up to an original goal of \$800, one of the Vacation Bible School leaders would get a pie in their face on Sunday during a church BBQ. If they were able to raise \$1000, Professor P, the Children's Ministry Director, would color her hair green!

The children came through on Friday bringing their total raised to \$1200! Eight Vacation Bible School leaders received whip cream pies in their faces courtesy of 8 children who attended the program and Professor P had green



hair on Sunday morning! Thanks to Tanya and Hillside Baptist for choosing Aliant Pioneers Backpacks for Kids as their charity.

On Alma 30 backpacks were filled. Text in Context, one of our business partner, who did the translation for the Backpack for Kids material asked to help as well and filled 5 backpacks.

Overall we were able to fill 193 backpacks between the 3 offices. Distribution was done by the same method as previous years. Aliant Pioneers splits the total evenly

between the 3 School Districts (1, 2, 11). 2 Backpacks were distributed internally and the rest were given 64,



64 and 63 respectively.

On Tuesday morning Michele Mouland loaded up her car on Mapleton Road with 64 backpacks and delivered to the District 1 French School Board in Dieppe. Their area includes Moncton, Dieppe, Shediac and Fredericton. Jeanelle Theriault (Photo on Right) from District 1 office accepted the backpacks.

On Wednesday morning Jennifer Dunfield's vehicle was loaded up at Edinburgh Drive with 64 backpacks to deliver to District 2 English School Board. Norval McConnell from District 2 accepted the backpacks. (Photo on bottom left, Jennifer Dunfield, Monique Desormeau, Norval McConnell and Sandra King)

District 11 received their backpacks during the 1st week of September.

Walk for Kids Help Phone

Kids Help Phone is Canada's only toll-free, 24-hour, bilingual and anonymous phone and web counseling, referral and information service for children and youth. Every day, professional counselors provide immediate, caring support to young people in urban and rural communities across the country.

On Sunday, May 3rd thousands of walkers, including 400 Bell Aliant walkers, from communities across Atlantic Canada raised over \$100,000 for Kids Help Phone as part of the National total of \$3 million.


Saltscapes Magazine Subscriptions benefit New Brunswick Pioneer Scholarship Foundation

Directing the power of the volunteer spirit to blood donation: Aliant Pioneer Volunteers

With close to 9,000 members, the Aliant Pioneer Volunteers are a powerful collective force for volunteerism. Last year, these former and current employees of the telecom company raised over \$335,000 for charity and donated 165,000 hours of their time to do volunteer work across the four Atlantic provinces.

The largest corporate-based volunteer organization in the region is now harnessing the power of its numbers to meet a new donation challenge pledging to donate blood to save lives, as a new member of the Partners for Life program.
